## PLAYWRIGHT'S NOTES The following is an excerpt from Sarah Ruhl's playwright's notes:

I started writing this play in 1996 after rereading a childhood book which includes an account of Oberammergau in the early 1900s. The man who played Christ was actually so holy as to have become a living embodiment. I started thinking, how would it shape or misshape a life to play a biblical role year after year? How are we scripted? Where is the line between authentic identity and performance? And is there, in fact, such a line?

The first act is set in 1575 in England, when Queen Elizabeth was about to shut down the Passion Plays in order to control religious representation. Up until then, more than one hundred towns in the British Isles performed the Passion. In the 1570s, Queen Elizabeth increased measures to cleanse England of papal trappings. Ordinary Catholics often housed priests in what they called "priest holes" in order to maintain Catholic rites.

The second act moves to Oberammergau Germany – a town where the Passion Play, begun in the Middle Ages, even now continues to be played every ten years. In 1934 the director of the Passion was already a member of the Nazi party, as was the actor who played Christ and the actress who played the Virgin Mary. As late as 1946, the village of Oberammergau denied knowing anything about concentration camps, although Dachau (where Oberammergau's one Jew was sent during the war) was only seventy-five miles away. In 1934, Hitler saw the Passion and was greeted with open arms.

Years after beginning Parts One and Two, I returned to the cycle. I discovered that there was a *Passion Play* in Spearfish, South Dakota, started by an actor from Germany in the 1940s. I felt that I had to continue the story. I found myself fascinated by how leaders use, misuse and legislate religion for their own political aims, and how leaders turn themselves into theatrical icons. I wrote the first draft of Part Three before the 2004 election, with a great sense of urgency. It's easy to feel powerless as the great political wheels turn, financed by enormous wealth. But then I thought about what starts every grass-roots movement – people organizing in one room.

# A MESSAGE FROM THE PRODUCERS

How to do three essentially different plays in one evening without losing one's mind and one's budget? ...I encourage smaller theatres with smaller budgets to band together and do the play in burnt-out factories, or synagogues, or churches, or out of doors, and not to be intimidated by the stage direction: "He gets on an enormous boat and sails off into the distance."

Almost two years ago, using these playful and inspiring words from Sarah Ruhl as our guide, our three companies embarked on the journey that has culminated in the performance you've just witnessed. What began as a small "passion project" between three small indie companies grew into this epic offering only through the tireless commitment and collaboration of a host of core players. This play offers us three depictions of communities banding together to put on a show—well, we could never have asked for a more inspired or dedicated community than our 35 person creative team. 11 core performers, 8 "passion players" (performing the Herculean task of serving as both chorus and crew), 3 directors, 4 designers, 3 stage managers, 3 associate producers, 3 assistant directors. Add to that our gifted fight director, fantastic publicist, inspired illustrator, videographers and photographers, the generous in-kind support from virtually every theatre in the city, the arts councils, foundations and over 150 individuals who gave to make this production happen, and of course our dedicated presenting partner in Crow's Theatre, and we don't think it's corny to say that it really has taken a village to raise this production.

We've been saying that Ruhl's play is about "faith and community", but really it's about faith in community. This project has renewed for all of us our faith in what a diverse, dedicated and inspired community working together can accomplish.




