## THE EVOLUTION OF A PLAY: DEVELOPMENT & PRODUCTION HISTORY

YICHUD (Seclusion) began as a twenty-minute scene between Rachel & Chaim in the Yichud Room.

This scene was written by **Julie Tepperman** and performed and self-directed by **Julie Tepperman** and **Aaron Willis**. It took place in a small room on the top floor of Toronto's Factory Theatre for about 15 people at a time as part of the Lab Cab Festival on May 31<sup>st</sup> & June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2008.

This scene was subsequently performed by Julie and Aaron at Toronto's Harbourfront Centre for a much larger audience as part of the Ashkenaz Festival on August 31<sup>st</sup> & September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2008.

The scene was subsequently expanded into a 75-minute one-act titled "*Yichud/Seclusion*" and was produced by Convergence Theatre as part of the Toronto Fringe's Next Stage Theatre Festival at Factory Studio Theatre, running January 8<sup>th</sup>-18<sup>th</sup>, 2009 with the following company:

Following the Next Stage presentation, the play was developed and almost entirely rewritten over the course of one year. During this time, Theatre Passe Muraille funded two hugely fruitful workshops in August and December of 2009.
